The balance of the Lord's Prayer is a balance we need to practice across our spiritual lives. I see four different stages modeled in this prayer. It is important to note the design and balance of this prayer because we indicate that we rely on or use it so often,

The first stage is intended to help us recognize God as the Holy Other. We are pressed to identify the great contrast between ourselves and God. God is referred to as our father, in heaven whose name is hallowed. We are challenged to appreciate this contrast as we are led to pray for God's kingdom to come and God's will to be followed on earth as it is already followed in heaven.

Next, the prayer shifts to the temporal world in which we live, breathe, and have our being. The request is first that our sustenance will be maintained through God's continual daily gifts. But then a shift is made to underscore the balance, the stability, and the equity we are to practice in our living. Just as we depend on God to provide for us daily and to forgive our debts, we need to bring balance, stability, and equity to every relationship we share. Forgiveness becomes treating others as we hope to be treated.

In the third stage we are expected to know that one of the surest ways to avoid accruing debt to God or others is to be protected from temptation and being delivered from evil. The more temptation we hold at bay and the greater evil we avoid, the less likely we will envision ourselves to be like the old song says; "another day older and deeper in debt."

Finally, we are reminded again that God is the eternal one. God is the one who holds the kingdom, the power and the glory from now through eternity.

We would live in a far different world if Christian people would practice what they pray. The impact of Christians on our world is minimized because they, we, are so reluctant to love the way God does, and to forgive the way God does. In Matthew 18 we encounter the time when Jesus pushes hard on Peter to understand forgiveness. Peter, thinking he is answering his question perfectly, regarding how many times one should forgive by saying up to seven times is in essence rebuked by Jesus for thinking too small. Jesus throws Peter's technically perfect answer back in his face.

He indicates a better answer would be that forgiveness should be limitless. He expands on Peter's statement of seven times and says it should be more like seventy-seven times. One should not put a number on forgiveness. There is a reason that Jesus immediately offered the parable of the servant who was consumed with getting and having.

You remember the parable; a servant was called in by his master to account for what he owed him. He owed a debt to his master which he could never repay. The master at first started to make him and his family accountable for the debt. When the man desperately pleaded for mercy the master relented and forgave him all his indebtedness. However, immediately the one who had been forgiven an unpayable amount went out and vigorously sought out anyone who owed him anything.

The callous and selfish man went on a tangent concerning a slave who owed him. When that slave could not pay a relatively small amount, he mercilessly retaliated by having this slave imprisoned. The other slaves got word to the master who changed his mind concerning the first slave because he failed to extend mercy like it was extended to him. As a result, the wrath of the master burned, and the ungrateful slave was thrust into torture.

Jesus concludes with the following words, "So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Transformation Team

The congregation is developing a Transformational Team to help us go through the interim period and to develop plans that will challenge us as we get a settled pastor on board and work with her or him to claim the future God holds out to us.

The term transformational is relied upon because it calls us to face the challenge ahead of us as we strive to be faithful to God. As members of this congregation, we need to be aware we are not transitioning from point A to point B. We are seeking to boldly face the future which may require us to move systematically from point A to point L or even further. Focusing on getting by and surviving is far different from considering how this church may adapt to thrive. Having this committee in place helps lead our congregation into a new era of ministry and service. This critical dynamic is essential if we are to break from the past and tackle the rapidly evolving landscape of Christianity in America today.

This model anticipates the need to be adaptative and to follow through in our church's current circumstances. Essentially the Transformational Team has been formed to address the special opportunities presented in the interim time, the time between other times. The anticipation is this will be a time of intrigue and challenge for the congregation. It will be a period through which we will rely on the leading of the Holy Spirit and the help of the Region. We will depend on them to assist us in doing self-assessment and providing guidance in developing a vision for the future. The right vision will call us to a recommit to the mission and ministry that awaits our congregation.

On Sunday, September 28th, and Sunday, October 5th, we will be receiving our special offering for the work of Reconciliation in and through our denomination. The Reconciliation Ministry Special Offering is received each year in congregations (in solidarity with World Communion Sunday). Funds generated by this special emphasis are used throughout the year to provide grants to ministries and congregations actively developing and implementing programs that promote our Church's Pro-Reconciliation and Anti-Racist identity. These programs and efforts seek to reveal, re-educate, and remove systemic and structural barriers in our communities that serve to deny the image of God and human thriving based on race.

Your gifts to Reconciliation Ministry strengthen our Church's witness to God's unending love for all of humanity. With your generosity, leaders, communities, and our congregations are being equipped to witness to God's love and justice in all times and in every season.
